MEETING NOTES: HLAA-EB Chapter Holiday Party and Annual Check-Up/Survey

On Dec. 8th, 2018, the HLAA East Bay Chapter rang in the holidays with the annual Holiday Party that included an introduction of EB Board/Steering Committee members, its Annual Check-Up/Survey discussion, and potluck goodies!

HLAA-East Bay Chapter Annual Check-Up Survey and Discussion


After our Master of Ceremony Gerry Niesar kicked off the Holiday Party, he turned the Annual Check-Up discussion over to Program Chair George Fitzgerald, who noted that to his surprise there were several familiar faces missing from

today's meeting (possibly due to other commitments at this busy time of year). Nevertheless, those members of the EB Chapter Board/Steering Committee who were present were invited to introduce themselves and briefly describe their domain of responsibilities.

All present members were also encouraged to complete the HLAA East Bay Chapter Annual Check-Up, a 2-page Survey prepared by Program Co-Chairs George and Susan Fitzgerald. Utilizing a list of 2018 program speakers on the first page, members were asked to rate (using a "1" to "3" scale) each of the monthly speakers and topics for 2018, and to provide suggestions regarding future Chapter speakers and topics for 2019. On the second page of the Survey, members were requested to provide answers or add comments in response to several specific questions about what they liked most about the HLAA East Bay Chapter, programming, Chapter activities (e.g., AfterWords, community fair information tables, group meetings, etc.), publicity, and Chapter meeting volunteers/helpers.

- 1. General Overview: What Members Like Most about the HLAA-East Bay A preliminary look at the Survey results, taken in conjunction with members' comments made during the discussion, indicates that Chapter members find considerable value in participating in the EB monthly meetings, as well as other Chapter activities. In particular, members seem to like the educational aspects of the Chapter meetings, along with the social interaction that occurs among participants at meetings and during other activities.
- 2. **Programming:** Speakers and their topics presented at our 2018 monthly EB Chapter meetings were highly rated with members' ratings on the 3-point scale generally falling between "1" = "Excellent" and "2" = "Good". During the discussion, members mentioned that they would like to continue having a variety of speakers on diverse hearing loss topics, while offering a balance between legal/policy issues and

updates on cochlear implants, hearing aids and Assistive Listening Devices (ALDs) technology. Program Co-chairs George and Susan Fitzgerald said that they welcome any suggestions for new speakers and topics.

3. Chapter Activities: AfterWords is an informal small group, led by George Chin, which meets for about an hour directly after the monthly Chapter General Meeting. Audience members who have

attended AfterWords meetings commented that they had found them guite helpful because "... you get a chance to tell your story, to talk to the experts, and to get your questions answered."

A Testimony from HLAA National: Why Shari Eberts Supports HLAA

Hearing loss can be a lonely proposition. Communication is difficult and often exhausting, even with those closest to you. People don't always understand the condition and wonder why you can hear them in certain settings, but not in others. It makes an invitation out to dinner, at the movies or at the theater a daunting proposal. Sometimes, it is tempting to just stay home and avoid the whole thing. That is how it seemed to me in my first few years of living with hearing loss. Not only was conversation becoming more challenging, I was also suffering from stigma and embarrassment. I hid my hearing loss as much as possible and wore my hearing aids only when absolutely necessary. I would not have considered using assistive listening technologies that might draw attention to my condition, even if I had known that they existed. I was following an unhealthy path toward isolation and withdrawal. **HLAA helped me change all that.** I found a place where hearing loss was not only accepted, but was the norm. I discovered the power of self-advocacy and the camaraderie of spending time with others who understood my struggles. I picked up communication tips and learned about accommodation options I had not considered. I found real friendships that I cherish today. I attended my first HLAA Convention in 2015 and from the moment I arrived I was amazed. I had never seen so many people with hearing loss in one place. It was thrilling to realize the depth and breadth of this new community I had joined. The level of hearing accessibility was incredible. I began to understand how much my life would improve if I simply asked for the accommodations I needed. HLAA showed me how to do just that. All this made it easier for me to accept my hearing loss and live well despite it. I gained the confidence to start a blog called LivingWithHearingLoss.com and share my hearing loss journey with the world. On the national level, HLAA amplifies our voice to fight for equal access for people with hearing loss, and to sponsor scientific studies such as the landmark 2016 National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine report that labeled hearing loss as a public health concern. These efforts help forge government policy decisions and determine future treatment protocols. The New York City Chapter, to which I belong, helped pass legislation requiring hearing loops in all public assembly areas constructed or renovated with public funds. There is power in numbers (48 million Americans with hearing loss) and we are fortunate we have HLAA to represent us!
